

What is a learning city?

'A learning city promotes lifelong learning for all'

UNESCO defines a learning city as a city that:

- effectively mobilizes its resources in every sector to promote inclusive learning from basic to higher education;
- revitalizes learning in families and communities;
- facilitates learning for and in the workplace;
- extends the use of modern learning technologies;
- enhances quality and excellence in learning; and
- fosters a culture of learning throughout life.

In doing so, it will enhance individual empowerment and social inclusion, economic development and cultural prosperity, and sustainable development.
